

#### Beacon August 2025



This month we're going to learn the history behind a song that my mother and sister sing regularly when on the phone with each other - GOD WILL TAKE CARE OF YOU.

In 1904, Civilla Martin was in Lestershire, New York, where her husband Walter was compiling a collection of hymns for the Practical Bible Training School. They were planning to travel to another town that day where Walter had a preaching assignment. Civilla woke up

sick, and her husband was about to cancel his plans, when their young child piped up and said; "Oh Daddy, you don't have to stay home because of mother - God will take care of us".

Mr. Martin caught his train and fulfilled his preaching obligation. When he returned home, Civilla handed him the words to GOD WILL TAKE CARE OF YOU which she had written while he was away. Going to his home organ, he composed the music and it was first published in the songbook he was compiling for the school.

J. C. Penney, who was descended from a long line of Baptist preachers, was finding great retail business success when the Crash of 1929 and Great Depression threw him into crisis. His business deals turned sour and he was overwhelmed with anxiety and insomnia. Later he was hospitalized with shingles and his mental state deteriorated, saying "I was broken nervously and physically, filled with despair, unable to see even a ray of hope. I had nothing to live for".

While in the hospital, he heard singing coming from the little hospital chapel: *Be not dismayed, whate'er betide*; *God will take care of you*. He went into the chapel and listened to the song. "Suddenly - something happened. I felt as if I had been instantly lifted out of the darkness of a dungeon into warm, brilliant sunlight." All worry left him as he realized just how much the Lord Jesus Christ cared for him. As he became one of America's greatest retail merchants, he often recalled - "those moments in that chapel were the most dramatic and glorious twenty minutes of my entire life".
