And the covenant which I have made on earth, let it be ratified in heaven. Amen."

Music Moment By John Hudson

Part two of our story of O HOLY NIGHT —

Born in 1813, John Sullivan Dwight was a graduate of Harvard College and Divinity School. He became a unitarian minister in Massachusetts but panic attacks struck him each time he sermonized. As a result, he eventually understood that he would be unable to continue in his ministry position.

Gifted and bright, he channeled his energies into writing, founding Dwight's Journal of Music. This publication inspired some of the most gifted musicians and music lovers in the northeast. As he looked for new material,

he read CANTIQUE DE NOEL in French. He was particularly moved by the lines "truly he taught us to love one another; his law is love and his gospel is peace. Chains shall he break for the slave is our brother; and in his name all oppression shall cease." Dwight opposed slavery. Keeping the original meaning intact, he translated it into English. Published in his magazine and in several songbooks of the period, O HOLY NIGHT quickly found favor in America, especially in the north during the Civil War.

Adams had been dead for many years and Cappeau and Dwight were old men when, on Christmas Eve 1906, Reginald Fessenden, a university professor in Pittsburgh and former chief chemist for Thomas Edison, did something long thought impossible. Using a new type of generator, Fessenden spoke into a microphone and, for the first time in history, a man's voice was broadcast over the airwaves, coincidentally on Christmas Eve. The first words spoken? "And it came to pass in those days that here went out a decree from Caesar Augustus that all the world should be taxed..."

Shocked radio operators on ships and wireless owners at newspapers sat stunned as their coded messages suddenly were understandable in English as a man read from the Gospel. It must have seemed like a miracle. People rushed to their wireless units to catch this amazing event. Then, Fessenden picked up his violin and play O HOLY NIGHT, the first song ever sent through the air via radio waves.

After an unbelievably challenging journey. O HOLY NIGHT has been sung millions of times in churches in every corner of the world and has become one of the most beautiful, inspired pieces and music ever created.



Can we get a couple of things clear, right off the bat? The homeless are not necessarily stupid, and the homeless are not necessarily mentally ill.

I don't often get offended at the national news (okay, I do), but they did a story last month that pushed my buttons. Everyone knows about the Portuguese national who murdered two students at Brown

University, and then went on to shoot a professor. A homeless man (they called him "John") provided the F.B.I. with crucial information about the killer, right down to his license plate. They were able to run the man down because of John's description. Some journalist on the broadcast mentioned, incredulously, "This homeless man lives in the basement of a building at the University??" I wanted to yell at the T.V. screen, "Yeah, so what? It was warm there. He possibly saved many lives, something you and I couldn't have done."

Some very brief medical definitions: A sociopath lacks empathy, can go into a rage, behaves impulsively, sees nothing wrong with their attitude. A psychopath has violent tendencies, manipulates others, can display a cold and uncaring attitude. A narcissist truly thinks the world revolves around them, needs consistent affirmation and admiration, doesn't give a hoot about you or your family. (Please don't diagnose your in-laws — that is so rude).

Do we ignore these people? Mercy, no. Jesus said to love your neighbor as yourself. He also said, "Be ye wise as serpents, and as harmless as doves." That means that IF the person is already diagnosed, you show them the love of Christ even as you educate yourself about the condition. I know some people who would drain me dry emotionally if I allowed them. I love them dearly, but I must hold them at arm's length. When I work the WATTS shelter every year, I can figure out quickly why some guests are there. My job is not to diagnose or judge, but to love them unconditionally. (This is also a big reason why the Laurel Center is so needed).

If you can't do anything else, smile whenever you see people that you think are "different". They are also God's children, and Jesus died on the Cross for them. God knows their mental status far better than we do. Always ask for wisdom from the Holy Spirit if you have an opportunity to reach out to the homeless.
